The War in Ukraine and the Future of European Memory

In the first place, the war in Ukraine forms a deep tragedy for the citizens of this European nation. Not only are numerous people being killed or wounded, and buildings being demolished, memory and the future of commemoration in Europe is at stake as well. Statues and cultural objects are being wrapped up in order to protect them from devastation. Other monuments are being removed as they refer to a past that one no longer wants to see as shared. New forms of commemoration will eventually take shape. In this final lecture, the speaker will shed light on the current situation in Ukraine and its relevance for the future of European Memory.
